June 24, 2020 Dear Members and Friends of the Desert Southwest Conference, I hold you, our laity and clergy in prayer in these days of uncertainty and change. As I do so, I call upon the words from scripture to uphold the spirits of the faithful in such a time as this. In Isaiah we are assured that God gives us strength to endure and carry on even when we are physically or spiritually exhausted.

'Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. (God) does not faint or grow weary; (God's) understanding is unsearchable. (God) gives power to the faint and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." (Isaiah 40:28-31)

Fully knowing that we are weary of the weeks of separation and suspension of in-person worship and other gatherings, this update is being sent with hope that we will not be lulled into thinking that God has abandoned us. We may be growing weary of the restraints to our usual life mandated by the restrictions and actions that are being required of us. Each of us has a critical part in the mitigation of the spread of COVID-19. Please follow the guidelines for safety precautions which include wearing a face mask, social distancing, frequent hand washing, staying at home if you are not feeling well, and cleaning and disinfecting. As the Coronavirus continues to spread in the Desert Southwest Conference, we must all be part of the solution.

Please remember that in the "Resource for Church Opening," on our DSC website, Phase 1 begins when state and local officials have reported a 14 day downward trend of cases, hospitals are treating patients without crisis care, and there is a robust testing program in place, including antibody testing. We are not yet there. In fact, in the last two weeks, there has been a dramatic increase in the number of cases of infections which has resulted in urgency about the continuing spread of the Coronavirus and serious concern about the availability of hospital beds to accommodate additional COVID patients. Based on available statistics, we are not yet ready to begin Phase 1 of the Re-Opening Plan. As we continue to wait for a pattern of decline in infections and deaths, our United Methodist Churches must continue to suspend in-person worship and group gatherings of any size.

In the past two weeks, there have been concerns raised about specific situations being faced by churches. Consequently, new for this UPDATE are three exceptions to the restrictions as we continue in Pre-Phase 1. Beginning today, Wednesday, June 24, 2020, with the consent of your District Superintendent, these exceptions are allowed: For worship planning, preparations, live streaming or recording in the church building, no more than 5 persons may be present at the same time in the same space. Strict adherence to the safety precautions in accordance with your church's re-opening plan must be observed. These should include but are not limited to observing physical distancing, washing hands frequently, wearing masks, cleaning and disinfecting touched surfaces such as the pulpit, podium, no sharing of microphones.

Food pantries and clothing centers that are ministries of caring and compassion offered by the church in response to the needs of the hungry in the community may resume following strict no-contact safety guidelines.

Child care and pre-schools may reopen following your church's reopening plan and CDC, state and local guidelines. This exception includes both third-party, non-UMC as well as church-sponsored child-care and pre-schools.

In order to open child-care or pre-schools, special legal issues must be considered. A legal webinar was offered and has been recorded and is available with notes. If you are interested in this material, please contact our Conference Chancellor, Marilee Miller Clarke. I am strongly suggesting that you and your team view the webinar and develop a plan for re-opening the child-care or pre-school with your church's legal advisor. If you do not have a legal advisor, our Conference Chancellor can be consulted. There is a \$300 one-time fee for her professional consultation (a UMC reduced rate).

Although we are not yet ready to enter Phase 1, these exceptions are being offered as we work together to stop the spread of the Coronavirus and in order to allow churches to respond to humanitarian need in your communities. If you would like to request an exception, please submit a request to your District Superintendent along with your team plan for re-opening if not previously submitted.

Other than these exceptions, as we continue to wait for a pattern of decline in infections and deaths, our Desert Southwest Conference United Methodist Churches must continue to suspend in-person worship and group gatherings of any size, except for those churches that have received permission for the three exceptions mentioned above.

As I write this update, I am deeply concerned about the real possibility of a spike due to a large gathering that occurred yesterday. Contrary to the advice of our medical, and scientific experts, many persons are letting our guard down, ignoring physical distancing, and forgoing facial coverings when in public. I ask you to please be a part of the solution, not part of the problem. Think of others around you, especially the most vulnerable, and help protect them from being infected. Pray unceasingly for an end to this pandemic, give thanks for those who are working on the front lines, and for those who are battling COVID-19.

Perhaps this is the time when we remind ourselves that those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength. In time, we shall be able to come together and greet one another in person in Christ's love. But until then, let us wait with patience.

HEALTH MINISTRY 2020: July COVID-19

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is the clinical disease caused by infection with SARS-CoV-2, a novel coronavirus that first was identified in Wuhan City, China in December 2019. Because the virus spread so rapidly throughout the world it has become a pandemic. As a result, we have not been able to attend church for several months now. In order to stay safe and slow the spread of the virus we have to physically distance ourselves, wear masks, and use frequent handwashing and/or hand sanitizer.

Stay healthy spiritually, socially and emotionally by staying connected with your church family. There is an option of watching church on our computers and phones go to gilbertumc.org and follow the link to worship services. We can also stay safely connected through phone calls, texting, emails, cards and letters.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS It takes between 2–14 days after exposure for symptoms of COVID-19 to develop (median is ~4 days). Common symptoms include: ● fever (≥100.4°F or 38°C) cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, muscle aches, fatigue. Less common symptoms include sputum production, headache, and diarrhea. In older adults, initial symptoms may be mild and fever might be absent.

As COVID-19 continues to spread in the United States, the CDC has recommended wearing cloth face coverings in public when physical distancing is difficult to maintain. Out and about in our communities, many Arizonans are following these recommendations. Studies continue to be published showing how COVID-19 can be spread through speaking, coughing, sneezing — including by people who don't even know they're sick.

Wear the cloth face covering in public, regardless of whether you feel sick or not. This way you're protecting yourself, your family, and others in the event you are infected and don't have any symptoms.

Wear the cloth face covering in public until you need to eat or drink, then make sure to keep it clean and uncontaminated. If you need to eat or drink in public, make sure you are more than 6 feet from others and then remove the mask and place it in a clean paper bag, container, or on a designated surface (like a new piece of paper on the far side of your desk). Make sure you wash or sanitize your hands before eating. After putting your mask on again, make sure you wash or sanitize your hands. Wash your mask after each day's use and store it in a clean bag or container.

Stay safe, follow the guidelines in your area. Pray often. Call a friend or loved one and share a bible verse or inspirational quote to stay connected.






Dear Friends of Family Promise...



GILBERT ARIZONA CELEBRATES CENTENNIAL 2020

July 6, 1920 Gilbert became incorporated as a town. Woodrow Wilson was President with Vice President Thomas R. Marshall the Arizona Governor at that time was Thomas Edward Campbell.

The first mayor of Gilbert was Mr. Everett Wilbur. Mr. Wilbur was a kindhearted inventive man and was a dedicated member of the Gilbert Methodist Church. Mr. Wilbur and many other church members like him, through many generations in the binds of Christian love, have helped to grow Gilbert in strength and faith.

Some early Gilbert settlers arrived in the 1890's to the early 1900's, seeking land they were able to acquire through the Homestead Entry system created during President Lincoln's term during the Civil War. Alfalfa put the Gilbert area on the map 1914-1917 during the World War 1 years because hay was the main fuel source for the troop's horses. Gilbert Township was known as the "Hay Capital". Most of our founding church members were hard working farmers that grew and/or utilized hay for their farms.

On the porch of the elementary school at the corner of Elliott and Gilbert Roads, on August 15, 1915 was organized the Methodist Episcopal Church. The multi-denominational group organized under the auspices of the Methodist church because that body had the facilities for establishing missionary churches and assisting in their financial support. Pastors for the next four years all lived in Chandler and served both the Chandler and Gilbert churches.

In 1918 subscriptions were solicited by Mr. C.H. Russell, Mr. H.W. Sawyer, and Mr. E.R. Wilbur from members and friends of the church in Gilbert, Mesa, Chandler and Phoenix. People gave regardless of their religious affiliation because it was believed the churches in a new community help to build it strong.

At the close of the canvass the building fund amounted to between \$2000.00 and

\$2500.00 and in 1918 the building was started. Mr. E.O. Cordell, superintendent of Gilbert Schools, assisted by Mr. Ayers drew the plans and Mr. Cordell superintended the construction.

In 1919 Gilbert was made a separate charge and welcomed its first full time pastor. Mr. Imel and his family stayed with the Wilbur family while a parsonage was being built. Mrs. Wilbur and Mrs. Imel organized a Junior League for children from primary through intermediate grades with an enrolment of 56 and an average attendance of 40.

Over the next four years church membership grew from 24 to 124. A women's Foreign Missionary Society was also organized as well as the Epworth league was formed for the youth. Children, youth and members of all ages worked together to help those in need in the community and around the world.

Now for over 100 years the Methodist church in Gilbert has been responding to needs of the community and the world with prayer, compassion and great love.

Everett R. Wilbur and has wife, Nelly O. Duncan Wilbur, donated 5 acres of land on the corner of Elliot and Gilbert roads for the building of the grammar school in 1912. This was the beginning of the Gilbert School District. The Wilbur's and their children became very active in the Gilbert Methodist church in 1919. When Gilbert was incorporated as a town in July of 1920 Everett Wilbur became the first Mayor of Gilbert.




Summer 2020 Children's Ministry What's Happening?
